

Use these questions to check the accessibility of your Canvas page(s):	Yes	No
Is your text content structured with headings?		
Do your images have alternative (alt) text or an image description?		
Are your videos captioned?		
Are your equations, formulas, and scientific notation accessible? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Create using the Canvas Equation Editor, available in the Rich Content Editor menu. 		
Are your readings accessible? Have your PDFs been converted with OCR (Optical Character Recognition) so that the text is readable?		
If you are using a publisher or other 3rd party content, have you checked to make sure it is accessible? If it is not, have you come up with an alternate plan? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Don't just take the publisher's word for it: check all elements for yourself. 		
Have you checked pages written in Canvas with Canvas's Accessibility Checker ? <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Please note that this is a very basic check: it may not catch all issues. 		
Are you prepared to offer necessary accommodations to students who need them? (refer to the student's accommodation letter to identify appropriate accommodations) <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To give an individual student extra time on, use the Moderate this Quiz feature. • If needed, you can give an individual student an extended due date on an assignment.
